

About the Abortion Pill Provider Liability and Education Act (APPLE ACT)

Why should
we pass
this act?

- Women will be made aware of risks, abuses and misinformation
- Providers may reconsider offering abortion pills when lawsuits and negative publicity expose dangers
- Opponents participating in debate over the APPLE Act will be forced to admit they have not talked honestly about risks
- Opponents participating in debate over the APPLE Act will be held to account for arguing that women should not have legal recourse for serious complications

The facts:

- Abortion has two victims: the pre-born child and the mother
- Abortion pills now comprise 63 percent of U.S. abortions¹
- A recent analysis of 865,000 insurance claims found that nearly 11 percent of women experienced serious complications—such as sepsis, infection or hemorrhage—within 45 days of a mifepristone abortion.² Since the release of this analysis and other data, the FDA has begun conducting a full review of the abortion pill mifepristone³

What will the APPLE ACT do?

- **Inform and empower women**, clarifying their right to hold abortion pill providers financially accountable for complications, injuries or death from chemical abortion
- **Require providers** to give written instructions clearly warning of risks such as infection, hemorrhage, ectopic pregnancy, incomplete abortion or need for surgery
- **Establish accountability** for manufacturers, distributors, prescribers and providers when they fail to inform, properly screen, monitor or respond to complications
- **Ensure anonymity** for women who bring lawsuits
- **Create a record** of deaths, injuries and failures in each state

Key questions for opponents:

If abortion pills are truly safe and simple, and complications are rare, why fear accountability?

Shouldn't women be informed of the risks of the abortion pill?

Shouldn't women have the right to seek justice in the event of harm?
